#### **CRIME OVERVIEW**

This section looks at the crimes of public interest that have occurred on the Warwick Central Safer Neighbourhood Team policing area, crimes such as burglary, theft, auto crime and criminal damage: Below is a very brief overview of the types of incidents that have been reported to us.

AUTOCRIME: Thefts from Motor Vehicles is still arguably out



**AUTOCRIME**: Thefts from Motor Vehicles is still arguably our biggest area of crime, yet possibly the easiest to prevent. We all know people are out at night trying car doors, on the prowl for anything they can sell to make easy money. Removing all valuable items such as Mobiles, Laptops, Sat-Nav etc. removes the temptation for offenders, and in turn reduces the risk of you becoming a victim. Never leave your car without checking it is locked, safe and secured. See the guide later on.......

<u>THEFTS:</u> 31 incidents of Shoplifting reported in October. As in previous months, alcohol and joints of meat still proving very popular. With Christmas on the horizon, perfumes and aftershaves, as well as coats and jackets being targeted.

Bicycles still vulnerable to being taken if not correctly secured. Even if you are only going to be a few minutes, make sure you lock and secure it to something sturdy.





ANTI-SOCIAL BEHAVIOUR: ASB incidents fairly static again this month. The MOP went off without incident, and was arguably one of the quietest fairs in recent years. Halloween also passed without incident. Chase Meadow has had a few issues recently with reports of youths congregating in the parks and causing general ASB, but there has also been a few incidents of property being damaged by youths throwing stones.

BURGLARIES: Garages and garden sheds still the main targets with power tools being much sought after. Like in previous months, rear gardens are particularly vulnerable and the favoured point of entry. Make sure side gates and entrances are always locked and secure. Check doors and windows are secured before leaving the house unattended. Leave a light on, or the radio to give the impression somebody is at home. If you are returning late, think about timer switches. People won't break into a house if they think someone is at home, so always try and give your home that lived in look.



#### **INCIDENTS & ISSUES IN YOUR LOCAL AREA.**

Below is a brief selection of some of the incidents that have occurred across the area, ward by ward.

\*\*PLEASE NOTE THAT THE FOLLOWING ARE BASED ON THE WARWICKSHIRE COUNTY COUNCIL WARDS, AND NOT THE WARWICK DISTRICT COUNCIL WARDS\*\*

#### **WARWICK NORTH WARD:**

- 4 residential burglaries reported in October, although only one resulted in a crime being raised. 2 related to a vulnerable person, and the last one was where a Housing Association came to fit a new door and locks at an address but ended up at the wrong property, which obviously caused a few problems when the resident returned and realised all the locks had been changed!!
- Just 4 incidents of ASB this month, and none of these relate to any area or persons being specifically targeted.
- 4 reports of Thefts from Motor Vehicles (TFMV) this month. A briefcase was removed from a car on Dickins Road around 20<sup>th</sup> October, whilst the others relate to vehicles parked in a business car park on Haywood Road.

#### **WARWICK WEST WARD:**

- 1 residential/domestic burglary reported this month. A property on Wilmhurst Road was found burgled on 6<sup>th</sup> October by the person looking after the property for the occupants who were on holiday. Access was through the side garden gate, and then in via the rear conservatory doors. A number of electrical devices were taken.
- 20 Anti-Social Behaviour incidents in October. The play area on Mander Grove on Chase Meadow has been popular with youths over the past few weeks, and this has unfortunately seen a number of properties on Mander Grove and Robins Way suffering

- damage, as they youths appear to be running through the alleyways and throwing stones into people's back garden or their driveways.
- 10 incidents of Theft from Motor Vehicle. A large proportion of these incidents took place on business car parks or hotel car parks where vehicles had either left whilst the owner was at work, or spending the night.

#### **WARWICK SOUTH WARD:**

- 24 reports of ASB this time around. Evenings see a number of calls to McDonalds and the Ten Pin bowling alley. With the colder, darker evenings, youths seem to be using both to hangout and keep warm, whilst taking advantage of free Wi-Fi and phone charging facilities. A few calls from around Portia Way reporting youths playing knock and run. We also currently have 2 or 3 ongoing neighbour disputes which we are working with partner agencies to resolve.
- 4 incidents of Theft from Motor Vehicles. The areas included Myton Croft, Rich Close and Palmer Crescent.
- 2 confirmed burglaries this month.

#### **BODY FOUND IN RIVER AT WARWICK CASTLE**

Officers searching for a missing man from Leamington, sadly found a body in Warwick on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup> October 2019

Detective Inspector Jim Rankin from Leamington CID, said: "While formal identification is yet to take place, the body discovered on Saturday is sadly believed to be that of 91-year-old Ronald Lovell who went missing from Old Milverton on Sunday, 13th October.

"We are not treating the death as suspicious at this time and our enquiries are ongoing to establish the circumstances surrounding this death.

"Our thoughts remain with all of Ronald's family, who are being supported by specially trained officers.

"Finally I would like to take this opportunity to thank Warwickshire Search and Rescue who have worked tirelessly in the search for Ronald, and I would also like to thank the local community for all of their support which has been a vital part of our investigation."

#### **OPERATION SNAP - REPORT POOR DRIVING AND DANGEROUS BEHAVIOUR**




Your submission will be sent to Warwickshire Police where the evidence will be reviewed by one of our road traffic officers, who will enforce against any offences committed. Any footage submitted through the portal can also be used by us to help educate other road users, and to advise on case results. For more information, please see Click for more info

As part of **OPERATION SNAP**, members of the public can submit (via a secure online form) digital showing potential traffic footage offences. This can range from driving dangerously or carelessly to overtaking on solid white lines, using a mobile phone while driving, ignoring traffic lights or dangerous driving around other road users, such as horse riders and cyclists.



#### How to Keep Your Safe & Secure

Having your car broken into and losing your things to thieves can be very distressing. Here are a few simple steps you can take to keep your vehicle, and what's in it, safe.



#### 1. Always lock it

Fuelling up or popping back into your house to get something are perfect examples of how easy it is to turn your back for a moment and forget your vehicle is unsecured. So get into the habit of locking your vehicle even if you're only going to be away from it for a moment.

#### 2. Close windows and the sun roof to prevent 'fishing'

Leaving windows and the sunroof open invites fishing for items through the gap by hand or with, say, a bent coat hanger, which could also be used to unlock a door for them to get in. Thieves can be ingenious. Don't give them the opportunity.

#### 3. Secure your number plates with tamper-resistant screws


The easiest way to change the identity of a stolen vehicle or avoid speeding tickets and parking tickets is to fit stolen number plates. Using security screws to attach your vehicle's number plates makes it harder for thieves to get your number.

#### 4. Fit locking, anti-tamper wheel nuts to secure alloy wheels

Stolen wheels are valuable, either as parts or for their scrap value. Using locking wheel nuts reduces the risk of your vehicle's wheels being stolen.

#### 5. Secure anything that's on the outside of your vehicle

Anything left on roof-racks, tailgate racks, holiday top boxes or in tool chests are easily stolen when the vehicle is parked. The use of cable locks, padlocks and self-locking tools chests, which are secured to the vehicle, makes them more secure, but still, don't leave things in them if you can avoid it. #### 6. Take it with you or hide it

Your mobile phone, coins for the car park, sunglasses, packs of medication or other items that can earn quick cash are irresistible to the opportunist thief. Remember, the cost of replacing a window is often much more than that of what's stolen. And it should go without saying that wallets, handbags, purses and credit cards should never be left in an unattended vehicle.

#### 7. Hide electrical items and leave no clues

Leaving Sat-Nav mounts, suction cup marks on windows or cables on view gives it away that you have left a Sat-Nav, smartphone or other device in your car. Even if they can't see the Sat-Nav or iPad they might still break in to see if it's stored in the car, out of sight.

#### 8. Tool theft from vans

Vans are often targeted by thieves for the tools stored inside. If you have to leave tools in a van overnight, it's a good idea to mark them clearly with your name / company name and address using paint pens and seal with a clear lacquer spray. Alternatively, you can use a variety of other property marking systems. Items that are clearly marked are less desirable and more difficult to sell on.

Consider using a lockable cabinet within your van to store tools – a number of security rated products are available. Small cameras are also designed to record inside vehicles. Visit securedbydesign.com (External Link) for more details.

You can also take photographs of items of value, make a note of the serial numbers and consider registering them online at a property register site like <a href="Immobilise">Immobilise</a> (External Link).



#### 9. Park in well-lit and busier areas

It can take less than 30 seconds to break into a vehicle. Parking in well-lit areas and busy streets increases the chances of a thief being seen, so they'll probably steer clear.

#### 10. Take your documents with you

Having a vehicle's registration and insurance documents could let a thief pretend to be the owner. Which means they could sell it on quite easily. So, never leave any documents in the vehicle.

#### 11. Choose your car park wisely

If possible, always try to park in well-lit and staffed car parks or those with a Park Mark safer parking award. To find one, simply check out <u>Park Mark (External Link)</u>.

# WARWICK CENTRAL COMMUNITY PRIORITIES

The top issues agreed at the Community Forum held on Thursday 24<sup>th</sup> October 2019 at Saltisford Church, Warwick were......

- 1. **Town Centre Patrols.** To carry out Hi-Viz patrols of the Town Centre, to offer reassurance to visitor and retailers alike. This will also include plain clothed patrols to hopefully ID pickpockets, and known shoplifters operating in the area.
- 2. **Patrols of Parks and Open Spaces.** Patrols of local parks and green spaces to tackle ASB, the use of mini motorbikes, and ensure these places can be enjoyed by the many, and not ruined by the few.
- 3. Anti-Social Behaviour Patrols of the Packmores Estate. Carry out patrols of the area, paying special attention to play area and known hotspots, and deal with people acting in an anti-social manner. We will also be intelligence gathering in terms of any other illicit behaviour in the area.
- 4. Anti-Social Behaviour Patrols of the Forbes Estate & Chase Meadow. Carry out patrols of the area, including Warwick Racecourse, paying special attention to play area and known hotspots, and deal with people acting in an anti-social manner. We will also be intelligence gathering in terms of any other illicit behaviour in the area.
